What progress have states made in the last year to adopt and fully implement paid family leave?

To assess progress in adopting and fully implementing a statewide paid family leave program of a minimum of 6 weeks, we have developed a ranking methodology that gives states credit for

- Implementing a statewide paid family leave program, or a more limited program for state employees
- The number of weeks of benefits provided in the paid family leave program
- Any legislative initiative between July 1, 2020 and August 1, 2021 to create or expand a paid family leave program

These state actions are assigned a ranking on a scale of 0 to 10, according to the below schema.

Progress assessment methodology: Has a state adopted and fully implemented a paid family leave program of a minimum of 6 weeks?

Additionally, we further evaluated state progress towards adopting and implementing a paid family leave program of at least 6 weeks, by comparing the state’s current status on this metric to that in the 2020 State Policy Roadmap. States are assessed as having adopted and fully implemented this policy, having made some progress towards adopting and fully implementing this policy, or having made no progress towards adopting and fully implementing this policy for both the 2020 and 2021 State Policy Roadmaps.

A state’s current paid family leave policies were confirmed by analyzing state statutes, state administrative codes, ballot initiatives, legislation, and other relevant government agency documents. The sources referenced to assess progress towards adopting and fully implementing a paid family leave program of a minimum of 6 weeks in each individual state are listed below.

We also performed an electronic search using Quorum State between July 1, 2020 and August 15, 2021 to assess legislative progress pertaining to paid family leave. The main search strategy used combinations of keywords for Paid family leave (paid WITHIN 10 of leave, OR Temporary Disability Insurance OR Maternity Leave Program OR Maternity Leave OR Parental Leave OR Paid WITHIN 5 of Parental Leave OR Paid parental leave OR Family and medical leave OR Paid family medical leave). Research staff conducted searches, analyzed results for relevant state legislation, and summarized the progress states made toward adopting and fully implementing a paid family leave program with at least 6 weeks of available benefits. Research staff also analyzed results for relevant state legislation and summarized actions states have taken to adopt and implement paid family leave programs for state employees and/or paid family leave programs with fewer than 6 weeks of available benefits.
